All of these terms describe the Z-Man He has had a spectacular life shooting guns, selling guns, modifying guns and developing new guns. He was responsible for the clever LR-300, which had a completely different operating system than conventional AR-type rifles that allowed for a side-folding stock. If his brand was Colt, HK, or FN, the LR-300 would have been more popular than it was when the design was bought by Para USA. Back in 1993, I remember shooting an early LR-300 at work, which proved ahead of its time. Zitta also started modifying STI's 2011 for Special Operations back in the '90s. One particular gun that earned attention was the Strike pistol. The Strike was a heavily modified 2011. There was a striker added to the frame's dust cover that allowed shooters to muzzle thump someone without pushing the slide out of battery. There was a shroud over the hammer to prevent clothing or the web of someones hand from stopping the firing of the pistol. Of course, there was also a spike protruding from the mainspring housing. Some naysayers said that we'd skewer out hands during a reload. If this happened to someone, they were not the sharpest tool. It isn't easy to drive a dull spike through the heel of a hand.

Zitta ran Aldo's Harley-Davidson Shop in Bernardston, Massachusetts, before closing it and moving to Tennessee. He is now my neighbor, shooting buddy and gunsmith. It's pretty cool to know such a living legend.
